

100 More Years of Summer Reading

Our centennial officially kicked off May 1, and what better way to celebrate a library's 100th birthday than with a special centennial summer reading program? "100

Years of Stories" will take readers ages 0-100 through each decade of the past 100 years with programs, book lists, and raffle prizes.

As always, we have something for everyone this summer.

Parents and children birth to pre-Kindergarten can participate by picking up the Summer Reading Log with suggested early-literacy activities, such as singing a song together, reading a rhyming book, and playing "I spy." Families can also pick up four different Fun Packs throughout the summer, special take-home activities for parents and children.

Children in Kindergarten to fifth grade can also pick up four different Fun Packs throughout the summer, as well as the Summer Reading Game Board, where they'll fill in a book icon for each day they read. After 40 days of reading they can return it to the library


by August 7 to enter our prize raffle. Throughout summer, the Lee Road branch will be hosting a series of children's programs called Crafts of the Past, where children in grades Kindergarten through fifth grade will be making pinwheels and paper flowers, Scottie dog pillows (all the rage in the 1930s), lava lamps (from the 1960s and 70s), and more.

For middle and high school students, participants will receive a prize for signing up and a raffle ticket for completing their summer reading assignment and turning in a book review form to library staff.

Adults have their own program, the Centennial Summer Celebration. They can visit any branch to submit an entry form for each book read or listened to, which makes them eligible for a chance to win weekly prizes, as well as one of three grand prizes: a Samsung Galaxy Tab 4 Nook, a prize package of \$100 in gift cards, and a Kindle Fire HD 6. Adults can also enter the drawing each time they attend any library program for adults throughout the summer.
