Library helps kids transition back to school

With this year's summer reading program over, Heights Libraries is ready to support children and families with what can be a challenging back-toschool transition.

The first few weeks of school can be difficult for kids as they adjust to new classmates, teachers, and expectations in the classroom. On top of that, "one challenge that schools face is seeing children return from summer break with weaker academic skills," said Sam Lapides, Heights Libraries Youth Services Manager. This widely documented phenomenon is called "summer learning loss" or "summer slide".

"That's where the library steps in. Once the school year starts, we're ready to help kids get back on track," Lapides said. "We offer staff- and volunteer-run drop-in homework help programs on Tuesdays and Thursdays after school, in addition to a wide variety of fun activities during the week to promote and encourage a love of reading."

In addition to offering free programs, the Library will be encouraging kids and their family

members to sign up for library cards. Since 1987, Library Card Sign-up Month has been held each September to mark the beginning of the school year. During the month, the American Library Association and libraries unite in a national effort to ensure every child signs-up for their own library card, and Heights Libraries is no exception.

"As far as school supplies go, a library card is perhaps the most important," said Lapides. "Lots of kids are expected to have computers and internet access at home for homework, but many don't. A library grants that access, with online resources like encyclopedias and other informational tools."

Kids can also check out books for research and book reports, and have a place to do their homework after school.

Getting a library card is simple: come in to any branch with a photo ID and proof of residency in Ohio. Kids under 18 need a parent or guardian signature for a full-service card, but can get a Three for Me card on their own. See heightslibrary.org for details.











For the past 25 years, Heights Libraries has published a Certified Annual Financial Report (CAFR), going above and beyond what most libraries do to report their financial position to both the state and the community. For the accuracy and thoroughness of this report, we regularly earn an award from the Government Financial Office Association, and we take out an ad in the Plain Dealer to make sure people know that this report is available in print and online for anyone to read.

In recent years, we have also placed a brief annual report, with some of the highlights of the past year along with our revenue and expenses, in the fall issue of our Check Us Out program guide, which is mailed to every residence in the Cleveland Heights-University Heights community (and starts on page 21).

Why do we make this effort? Why do we get our financials and our annual report into as many hands as possible? Trust.

We want each of you to know how your tax dollars are spent. Building maintenance and repairs, expanding our collections, and paying our staff are all crucial to our operations. - We more than doubled our outreach visits to children and vulnerable adults, reaching over 13,000 people.

- We ensured that the Coventry P.E.A.C.E. Campus would remain a public park, open to all, by acquiring the property from the Cleveland Heights-University Heights School District.

Highlights 2018

Coventry PEACE Campus

On March 31, 2018, Heights Libraries acquired a six-acre property from the Cleveland Heights-University Heights School District. The property is comprised of the former Coventry Elementary school, which houses the Coventry P.E.A.C.E. Campus (People Enhancing a Child's Environment), a playground and large green space known as Coventry P.E.A.C.E. Park.

The Board of Library Trustees gave the following reasons for acquiring this property:

- Maintain existing parking for the Library
- Maintain the green space as a public park
- Work with existing stakeholders to maintain and improve the playground
- Keep the property from being vacant by supporting the current tenants in their mission to become financially independent within two years
- The ownership of the property supports the Library's strategic plan to benefit the community

After obtaining the property from the School District, Heights Libraries signed leases with the following P.E.A.C.E. Campus tenants: Artful, Ensemble Theater, Family Connections, Lake Erie Ink, Urban Oak School, Sherri Skedel, and Reaching Heights/Future Heights. These tenants were renting from the School District before the property changed hands. New two year leases were signed with the understanding that the tenants would fundraise and organize themselves to take over operations of the structure by 2020. The land itself will remain in Library domain.

By December 31, 2018, Heights Libraries received \$94,000 in revenue from the tenants and spent \$200,057 on expenses including \$44.587.69 on repairs to the parking lot and the P.E.A.C.E. Park. The terms of lease require the tenants to repay Heights Libraries for any advances in operating costs. With this transaction, Heights Libraries has successfully facilitated communication among the City of Cleveland Heights, the School District, Coventry P.E.A.C.E. Campus tenants, park, and the Library itself.

Financial Award

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the Cleveland Heights-University Heights Public Library for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the year ended December 31, 2018.

Fine Elimination

The Library joined many other public libraries across the country in eliminating overdue fines on the majority if items in our collections. Since our children's materials were already fine free and seniors qualify for fine forgiveness, it seemed only reasonable to go "all the way." The image of a public library teaching responsibility to patrons through fines is out of date and destructive to our customer service approach.



We wished to achieve three things by eliminating fines:

- Improved access to our collections for all people.
- Increased circulation of our materials.
- Eliminate outdated rules and establish best practices.

Nearly all overdue fines have been eliminated with the exception of hotspots, videogames, and overdue fines for late interlibrary loan materials which belong to other libraries.

Fine elimination resulted in the value of materials returned nearly doubling from \$94,369 to \$185,955 from 2017 to 2018, and fines collected decreased by \$24,847.



Highlights 2018

Job Readiness and Economic Development

Heights Libraries hosted 25 classes for job seekers in 2018, including Resume Writing, Job Search Essentials from LinkedIn, and Interviewing. Those who preferred online training logged into Heights Libraries' Lynda.com account and earned 185 certificates of completion in classes such as leadership, business writing, sales, retail, purchasing, strategic planning and computer skills. The Youth Services Department designed and launched ongoing career readiness resources for teens, including resume and writing help.

In addition to offering business training for customers, all branches celebrated Small Business Saturday in November in partnership with the Heights Hillcrest Regional Chamber of Commerce and American Express.

On the Same Page Community Read

Heights Libraries presented the fourth year of On the Same Page, an initiative designed to foster community-wide conversation and personal connections through a shared reading experience. This year's selection of titles focused on the harrowing experiences of refugees worldwide, from fleeing a country of origin to resettlement in a foreign land. On the Same Page kicked off with a community potluck/soccer game, and programs for all ages occurred throughout the fall season, in conjunction with many of our community partners.

Passport Services

All circulation assistants and two managers in the Heights Libraries Circulation Department became proficient in passport application processing. The program officially rolled out in June, and by the end of 2018, staff had processed 315 applications and taken 330 photos, netting a grand total of \$16,238.76 in fees in just seven months.

Safety and Security

All Security Department staff received training to proficiently use the CCTV security camera system. The Department also partnered with continuing education staff on a two-part Emergency Preparedness class for the public.

University Heights branch staff partnered with the UH Fire Department to host programs on public safety concerns.

The Information Technology Department successfully implemented a new phone system for better customer service and increased safety and security for staff.

The Buildings Department created plans for improving the handicapped entrance and basement space at the Coventry Village Branch which will be implemented in 2019.

Research and planning has been finalized for increased lighting in multiple Library parking lots and will be implemented in 2019

Services for New Americans


The Noble Neighborhood branch expanded services to new Americans. It offered an eight-week support program for refugee women, in conjunction with ASIA, Inc. Driving lessons were provided for five Nepali speaking driver's license applicants with funding from private sources. Staff also partnered with the City of Cleveland Heights, local organizations, and community members to increase services to refugees in the Noble Neighborhood through ongoing language and citizenship classes. weekly welcome hubs, and the promotion of community awareness and support for the refugee experience through programming.



Financials for Fiscal Year 2017 – 18

Total Income was \$61,434. Earned income was \$48,188, which included book sales of \$43,163. Merchandise sales, vending commissions, interest income and FRIENDS events provided the balance. Our contributed income total of \$13,246 came from membership dues and donations.

Total expenses and grants totaled \$61,944 in FY 2017 - 18. Donations to the library and library related entities of \$50,015 were allocated as follows:

Fund for the Future of Heights Libraries 2018



The Fund for the Future of Heights Libraries' (FFHL) total 2018 assets equaled \$54,989, which is an \$11,730 increase (27 percent) over 2017.

FFHL's primary revenue sources are profits from its annual Honor Roll Dinner, individual donations from the Board and community members, and the interest on the Cleveland Foundation fund. The largest individual donation in 2018 came from the McFarland Family.

The FFHL donated artwork over the fireplace for the newly renovated University Heights Branch in 2018.

Hugh Weinberg replaced Rob Fischer as President of the Board of Directors in February 2018. Chase Klingentein, Jackie Nachman and Ray Gonzales joined the board in 2018.

Two new subdivisions were created: The Marketing Committee, a subdivision of the Development Committee, to be presided over by Adaora Schmeidl; and the Dinner Subcommittee, whose members are Sue Janssen, Jackie Nachman and Courtney Eaton.

The Board wrote and approved a new mission statement for the FFHL: "Creating an endowment to support Heights Libraries buildings, property and services for future generations. Gifts are invested for secure and conservative growth within the Cleveland Foundation.


